COLORADO SYMPHONY ANNOUNCES 2025 CHAMBER MUSIC SERIES

Bringing the music of Schubert and Yun to the Grand Lake Creative District and Northglenn's Parsons Theater.



Sep. 10, 2025 – Denver, CO – The Colorado Symphony has unveiled its 2025 Chamber Music Series, an inspiring series of small-ensemble performances designed to bring audiences closer to the music and the musicians. Featuring the timeless beauty of Schubert's Octet alongside the distinctiveness of composer Isang Yun's Octet, the series offers an unparalleled opportunity to experience classical music in an intimate, up-close setting.

The ensemble features Yumi Hwang-Williams (Concertmaster), Owen Lin (Violin), Phillip Stevens (Viola), Chloe Hong (Assistant Principal Cello), August Ramos (Bass), Nick Davies (Bass / Utility Clarinet), Patrick Hodge (Assistant Principal / Utility horn), and Morgan Davison (2nd / Assistant Principal Bassoon).

"These concerts give audiences the rare chance to hear our musicians in their purest form: unplugged, close-up, and completely in the moment," said Davies. "It's a chance to discover how eight musicians can create a world of sound and storytelling."
